APPEARANCE AND REALITY. By *F. H. Bradley*. 2nd edition. Oxford. \$2.75. A classic of idealistic philosophy, written with a speculative boldness and a dazzling style that no philosopher today would dare aspire to.

HUME AND LOCKE. By *T. H. Green*. Crowell-Apollo. \$2.45. A 19th-century philosopher, now much too neglected, offers a penetrating critique of the empirical tradition in British philosophy.

REMARKS ON THE FOUNDATIONS OF MATHEMATICS. By *Ludwig Wittgenstein*. M.I.T. \$3.45. Posthumous ruminations on the most elementary aspects of mathematics. (No technical equipment required of the reader beyond the ability to count.) Wittgenstein's most tentative and groping work, but probably the most radical key to his thought—and, of course, usually unread by most Wittgensteinians. Should be required reading for all high-school teachers trying to push the New Math down the throats of children.

SEARCH FOR A METHOD. By *Jean-Paul Sartre*. Random-Vintage. \$1.65. Attempting to take the giant step beyond his earlier Existentialism, the author gives us some brilliant, sometimes peculiarly Sartrian, but often very relevant observations on the basis of the social sciences.

STUDIES IN THE PHILOSOPHY OF THOUGHT AND ACTION. By *P. F. Strawson*. Oxford. \$2.95. A sturdy English philosopher, one of the leaders of the school of "ordinary-language" philosophy, tries to see mind as it is involved with action rather than passive contemplation.

NEWTONIAN STUDIES. By *Alexandre Koyre*. Chicago-Phoenix. \$2.45. An important contribution to the history of ideas, which sheds much light on the inception of our present scientific era.

OTHER MINDS. By *John Wisdom*. California. \$1.95. An odd but very provocative mind, Wisdom is able to put life in some of the old philosophical controversies.

THEOLOGY OF THE EARLY GREEK PHILOSOPHERS. By *Werner Jaeger*. Oxford. \$1.95. Learned and eloquent, the author reminds us that the earliest Greek thinkers, who paved the way toward philosophy and ultimately science, were not pure rationalists but men in the grip of a religious vision.

WILL TO POWER. By *Friedrich Wilhelm Nietzsche*. Random-Vintage. \$2.95. This new translation by Walter Kaufmann and R. J. Hollingdale was badly needed. Here is Nietzsche sounding his most extreme but also most prophetic notes.

INTRODUCTION TO VALUE THEORY. By *Nicholas Rescher*. Prentice-Hall. \$2.95. Distinguished by its comprehensiveness and balance. Clear, but also more than an introduction.

MARTIN HEIDEGGER ON BEING HUMAN. By *Richard Schmitt*. Random. \$2.75. Heidegger's "Being and Time" has been one of the most influential, but also least understood, works in contemporary philosophy. Here is a helpful key.
